Showers and thunderstorms, some with locally heavy rainfall, continue to move onshore in the eastern Panhandle and Big Bend. Additional development is possible this afternoon across inland areas.

Flood Alerts

Flood Watches are in effect for Taylor, & Lafayette County until 1400 ET.

Areal Flood Warnings continue for parts of Taylor, Dixie, Lafayette, Levy, and Citrus Counties.

Several River Flood Warnings are in effect across the western half of the Peninsula.



Estimated Rainfall Totals So Far Today



Heavy rain again fell overnight and this morning across Taylor and Lafayette County (additional 2-4")

The highest totals so far today are in southeastern Bay County, with 5-8" having fell in the last 6 hours.

Rainfall Totals Next 24 Hours

The heavy rainfall threat continues today in the Panhandle and Big Bend, with an additional 1-3" expected. Locally higher amounts of 4-6" can't be ruled out.

Rain chances decrease after sunset with less coverage tonight than previous nights. Rain chances tomorrow are isolated, with more typical hit-and-miss summer thunderstorms.





Flash Flood Outlook

The Flash Flood Threat continues today across North Florida. The threat level has been reduced by one in the mid-day update from the Weather Prediction Center.

There is no flash flood threat for Tuesday or Wednesday!

Rainfall Needed to Cause Flash Flooding



In the eastern Panhandle, Big Bend, and Nature Coast, it will only take about 2" within 1 hour or 3-4" with 6 hours to produce flash flooding due to extremely saturated conditions.

Current/Forecast River Statuses and 3-Day Rainfall

Several River Flood Warnings remain in effect across West Central Florida.

In general, after today, rainfall totals each day are not expected to contribute to rising river levels (0.5"-1").





- 43 Access to river gage becomes limited as the Bible Camp Road boat ramp becomes flooded and the last half mile of Bible Camp Road begins to flood in Columbia County. Overland flooding begins past the Santa Fe River sink in the park and will cut-off access road to south end of the park.
- 42 Boat ramp at the end of Bible Camp Road begins to flood.



SANTA FE RIVER AT WORTHINGTON SPRINGS (IN NAVD88)

- 60 A driveway near Southwest 102nd Court in Union County begins to flood at this level. Flooding along the river continues to impact boat ramps, docks and campgrounds in the area.
- 59 Chastain-Seay Park in Worthington Springs is generally closed to the public as access roads within the park become flooded.
- 58 Picnic Areas and campsites at Chastain-Seay Park in Worthington Springs begin to flood.
- 56 The boat ramp and floating dock at Chastain-Seay Park in Worthington Springs begin to flood.

- 23 Water has flooded all of River Road NE and Ancient Oaks private roads up to 3 feet deep in some areas. All houses and mobile homes now have water flowing underneath. Water is also flooding property and is under some houses on Cooey Island near Palm Street NE.
- 19.5 Water begins to flood downstream at Steinhatchee Falls Park. Minor flooding of roads begins along River Road NE. Water will begin to encroach onto the yards of residences in the Ancient Oaks Community in Steinhatchee.
- 16.75 Steinhatchee Falls Park is subject to closure above this level.



WITHLACOOCHEE RIVER (FL) AT DUNNELLON

29 ft. – Docks and boat ramps flood.



- 9 Arrowhead subdivision floods with water in homes.
- 8 Water approaches house foundations in Arrowhead subdivision.

CYPRESS CREEK (FL) AT WORTHINGTON GARDENS

 8 ft. – Flooding begins at the recreation area on State Road 54.

ALAFIA RIVER (FL) AT LITHIA



- 13 ft. River Drive and Squirrel Run Way downstream of County Road 640 are completely covered by water. One home begins to flood.
- 12 ft. Water begins to affect River Drive and Squirrel Run Way downstream of County Road 640.

- 13 ft. The canoe rental area floods.
- 11 ft. The river overflows its banks.



- 15 ft. Low sections of State Road 64 start to flood.
- 11 ft. Private road and bridge 1 mile downstream flood. Agricultural, rural Kibler area begins to flood.



MYAKKA RIVER (FL) AT MYAKKA RIVER STATE PARK

- 8.5 ft. Most of Myakka State Park is closed.
- 8 ft. The main road at Myakka State Park floods.
- 7 ft. Trails, picnic areas, and parking lots at Myakka State Park flood.



PEACE RIVER (FL) AT ZOLFO SPRINGS



8 ft. – Private roads downstream flood.

PEACE RIVER (FL) AT ARCADIA



- 15 ft. River Acres is impacted
- 14 ft. Peace River Campground flood and 6 homes at River Acres are impacted.
- 13 ft. Peace River Estates floods affecting several dozen homes.
- 12 ft. The Girl Scout camp floods.
- 11 ft. Access roads to River Acres become flooded.

HORSE CREEK (FL) NEAR ARCADIA



- 14 ft. Buildings in Hidden Acres flood.
- 12 ft. The access road to Hidden Acres is impassable.
- 11 ft. Secondary roads in Hidden Acres and Royal Palm begin to flood.

Summary:

- What:
 - A weak area of low pressure off the coast of the Mid-Atlantic will move northeastward into the open Atlantic later today. This system has a 10% chance of formation during the next 48 hours. This system poses no threat to Florida.
 - Heavy rainfall and flash flooding remains an ongoing threat in the eastern Panhandle and Big Bend today
 - <u>2-3" in the eastern Panhandle and Big Bend (localized 3-6+");</u> <1" in the Peninsula; NEXT 24 HOURS.
 - River flooding continues across much of the western Peninsula.
 - High rip current risk at all Panhandle beaches
- Where: The highest threat of flash flooding will be along the coastal regions of the eastern Panhandle and Big Bend with only a very isolated risk elsewhere in the western Panhandle and Northeast Florida. There is no flash flood threat in Central or South Florida.
- When: The flash flood threat continues through this afternoon. River flood impacts continue all week. Rain chances become more isolated/seasonal starting tomorrow.
- **Potential Impacts**: Heavy rainfall may produce flooding in areas where abundant rain has fallen over the last week and soils are saturated. Dirt roads may become washed out. Sheet flow and standing water may temporarily close roadways. A few locations will see minor impacts to structures. Many locations will see boat ramps, docks, and riverside parks flooded.
