Overview/Recent Changes:

Eta has made landfall near Cedar Key and continues to quickly weaken.

Tropical Storm and Storm Surge Warnings have been canceled in Southwest Florida.

Gusty winds and heavy rainfall linger in West-Central and Northeast Florida until early afternoon.

From the National Hurricane Center – Tropical Storm Eta



- The center of Tropical Storm Eta is located over Cedar Key, Florida and moving to the northeast at 13 mph.
- Maximum sustained winds are near 50 mph, and Eta is quickly weakening.
- Eta should exit Northeast Florida into the Atlantic early this afternoon.

Key Messages for Tropical Storm Eta Advisory 48: 4:00 AM EST Thu Nov 12, 2020

1. There remains a danger of life-threatening storm surge along portions of the Florida Gulf Coast from the Middle of Longboat Key to the Suwannee River, including Tampa Bay. Residents in this area should follow any advice given by local officials.

2. Tropical-storm-force winds are expected in the warning area along portions of the Florida Gulf Coast during the next few hours, and in the warning area on the east coast later today.

3. Localized bands of heavy rainfall will continue to impact portions of the Florida Peninsula today, resulting in isolated flash and urban flooding, especially across previously inundated areas. Minor river flooding is expected across portions of west Florida lasting into the weekend.

Maximum Wind Gusts

Next 24 Hours

Gusts of 40-50 mph are possible near Tampa Bay, along the Nature Coast, and across to Northeast Florida.

Wind gusts of 25-35 mph will remain possible across the rest of the Peninsula in any rain showers or thunderstorms.

Tropical storm and/or hurricane conditions are **POSSIBLE** in Watch area

Issued up to 48 hours in advance of tropical storm force winds

Tropical storm and/or hurricane conditions are **EXPECTED** in Warning area

Issued up to 36 hours in advance of onset of tropical storm force winds

Hurricane preparedness activities become difficult once winds reach tropical storm force. Watches & Warnings are issued in advance of onset of tropical storm force winds, 39-73mph

Keys, and Northeast Florida including the St. Johns River. Tides are around 1' above normal.



Storm Surge/Coastal Flooding

Tropical Storm Eta

Water level peaked at high tide yesterday evening. However, water will be slow to recede, particularly from Tampa Bay. Through this morning, surge of 2-4' is possible at high tide late morning and mid-day.

5 Port Tampa Drive and half the homes in Port Tampa City are flooded.

2.7 A few homes south of Gandy Blvd and west of Westshore Drive begin to flood.Gandy Boat Ramp floods. Portions of MacDill Air Force Base RV Park and Picnic Island Blvd begin to flood.

2 Low lying coastal areas begin to flood.

Storm surge peaked at around 4' in northern Tampa Bay at high tide just before midnight.

Forecast Wave Heights

Surf will gradually decrease today in the Gulf, but will build in the Atlantic. By tomorrow afternoon, wave heights will be 2-4' statewide.

Rainfall Totals Next 24 Hours





Generally, 1-2" today. Locally higher amounts of 3-4".

In urban Southeast Florida and West-Central Florida, even 1-2" could trigger additional urban/flash flooding.

Official Forecast Track

From the National Hurricane Center – Tropical Storm Theta



Theta is maintaining intensity in the far northeastern Atlantic. This system poses no threat to land as it continues eastward.



Tropical Weather Outlook

Possible Areas of Development During the Next 5 Days (LINK)



A tropical wave located over the central Caribbean Sea continues to produce a large area of showers and thunderstorms.

Satellite imagery indicates that the disturbance is gradually becoming better organized, and a tropical depression will likely form during the next 2 to 3 days as it moves slowly westward over the central and western Caribbean Sea.

This system is not expected to bring impacts to Florida over the next 7 days, if at all.

*Formation chance through 48 hrs...high...70%. *Formation chance through 5 days...high...90%.



Overall Summary

Tropical Storm Eta

- Eta brought heavy rainfall, storm surge, and gusty winds to the Tampa Bay area overnight, but impacts are gradually ending.
- The center of Tropical Storm Eta is located over Cedar Key, Florida (made landfall at 4:20am) and is moving to the northeast at 13 mph.
- Maximum sustained winds are near 50 mph, and Eta is quickly weakening.
- Eta should exit Northeast Florida into the Atlantic early this afternoon as a minimal tropical storm.

Tropical Storm Theta

• Theta poses no threat to land as it moves over the open Atlantic.

Invest 98L - Caribbean Wave

- A tropical wave located over the central Caribbean Sea continues to produce a large area of showers and thunderstorms.
- Satellite imagery indicates that the disturbance is gradually becoming better organized, and a tropical depression will likely form during the next 2 to 3 days as it moves slowly westward over the central and western Caribbean Sea.
- This system has a 70% (high) chance of formation during the next 48 hours and a 90% (high) chance during the next 5 days.
- This system is not expected to bring impacts to Florida over the next 7 days, if at all.
- The next name on the list is lota (eye-o-tah)



Florida Outlook

Florida Outlook:

- Storm Surge Warnings: Levy, Citrus, Hernando, Pasco, Pinellas, Hillsborough, Manatee
- Coastal Flood Advisories/Statements: Duval, Clay, Putnam, St. Johns, Flagler, Collier, Monroe (Keys and Mainland)
- Tropical Storm Warnings: Nassau, Duval, Flagler, St. Johns, Baker, Clay, St. Johns, Bradford, Union, southern Columbia, Gilchrist, Alachua, Levy, Marion, Citrus, Hernando, Pasco, Sumter, Lake, Pinellas, Hillsborough, Polk, and Manatee
- Flood/Flash Flood Watches: Levy, Citrus, Hernando, Pasco, Sumter, Pinellas, Hillsborough, Polk, Manatee, Sarasota, coastal Palm Beach, coastal Broward, and coastal Miami-Dade
- River Flood Warnings: St. Johns at Astor, Alafia River, Little Manatee River, Manatee River, Myakka River, and the Peace River at Zolfo Springs and Arcadia.
- Gusts to tropical-storm-force are ongoing across Northeast and West-Central Florida (35-45mph).
- Storm surge of 2-4' is still ongoing along parts of the West Coast.
- The tornado threat is minimal today and there is no severe weather outlook.
- Locally heavy rainfall will continue in some trialing rain bands near Tampa Bay and Southeast Florida.
- Additional rainfall totals of 1-2" are forecast, with localized values of 3-4" that could result in additional flash flooding.
- Several rivers in West-Central Florida will rise into minor or moderate flood stage over the next couple to several days.
- Impacts from Tropical Storm Eta are expected to end this afternoon.
