8 AM ET Wednesday: Florida Threats & Changes Since Last Packet



Overview/Recent Changes: ***HURRICANE WARNINGS IN EFFECT FROM STEINHATCHEE TO CHASSAHOWITZKA*** Elsa became a Category 1 hurricane overnight, but has weakened again to a strong tropical storm. Elsa is expected to landfall near Steinhatchee in Dixie County within the next few hours. Several rivers in North and West Central Florida are now expected to reach moderate flood stage over the next few days. Tropical Storm Warnings continue north of Charlotte County into the eastern Big Bend/Suwannee Valley. Elsa expected to exit the state this evening.

- The center of Elsa 35 miles west of Cedar Key, and moving to the north at 14 mph.
- Elsa remains a tropical storm with maximum sustained winds near 65 mph.
- Elsa will continue moving north or northnortheast today and then northeast tonight after it exits the state.
- Trailing strong rain bands are expected to continue to affect portions of Central and South Florida through this afternoon and portions of North Florida until around midnight.

Damaging Wind Threat Overview

Tropical Storm Elsa

The greatest wind threat is along the immediate coast of the Big Bend and Nature Coast where gusts of 60-70 mph are possible.

Inland Northeast Florida could see winds of 35-45 mph with gusts up of 60 mph.

Other locations could see wind gusts of 20-30mph, primarily in the outer bands.

Through the next 48 hours, additional rainfall totals of 2-4" are expected across Northeast Florida, Suwannee Valley and eastern Big Bend with localized totals of 6-8" possible.

Rainfall totals will be less south of I-4 around 0.5-2".

There remains a **Moderate Flash Flood Risk** (level 3 of 4) for the eastern Big Bend and Suwannee Valley through Wednesday night.

Overall Summary

Tropical Storm Elsa

- The center of Elsa is about 35 miles west of Cedar Key, and moving to the north at 14 mph with max sustained winds around 65 mph.
- Elsa is likely to make landfall within the next few hours near Dixie and Taylor Counties and should exit the state this evening <u>Florida Outlook:</u>
- The storm remains lopsided with nearly all of the wind, rain, surge, and tornado threat on the northern and eastern side of the storm.
- Impacts will continue through this afternoon along the Gulf Coast, but should wane this evening and tonight.
- Tropical Storm, Hurricane, Storm Surge, Tornado and Flood Watches and Warnings remain in effect but should expire tonight.
- A widespread 2-4" of rain is possible across the eastern Big Bend and Suwannee Valley today with localized totals of 6-8" possible. This could result in some urban or flash flooding due to wet/saturated soils.
- Saturated soils due to 200-300% of normal rainfall over the last two weeks will make trees more susceptible to falling in strong winds.
- Minor to moderate river flooding is forecast for some North Florida and West Florida areas over the coming days through this weekend.
- Dangerous rip currents are expected at all Florida beaches.
