Tropical Storm Elsa

11 AM ET Wednesday: Florida Threats & Changes Since Last Packet



Overview/Recent Changes:

Elsa made landfall in Taylor County around 11 AM ET as a Tropical Storm with maximum sustained winds around 65 mph. All hurricane warnings have been cancelled, with tropical storm watches and warnings cancelled in Southwest Florida. Impacts continue in Northeast Florida through this afternoon.

- The center of Elsa is near Steinhatchee, and moving to the north at 14 mph.
- Elsa remains a tropical storm with maximum sustained winds near 65 mph.
- Elsa will continue moving north or northnortheast today and then northeast tonight after it exits the state.
- Trailing strong rain bands are expected to continue to affect portions of Central and Southwest Florida through this afternoon and portions of Northeast Florida until around midnight.

Damaging Wind Threat Overview

Tropical Storm Elsa

The greatest wind threat is along the immediate coast of the eastern Big Bend where gusts of 50-60 mph are possible.

Inland Northeast Florida could see winds of 35-45 mph with gusts up of 55 mph.

Other locations could see wind gusts of 20-30mph, primarily in the outer bands.

Through the next 12 hours, additional rainfall totals of 2-4" are expected across Northeast Florida, Suwannee Valley and eastern Big Bend with localized totals of 6-8" possible.

Rainfall totals will be less south of I-4 around 0.5-2".

Overall Summary

Tropical Storm Elsa

- At 11:00 am EDT Wednesday, Tropical Storm Elsa made landfall in Taylor County near Keaton Beach with maximum winds of 65mph.
- Elsa is moving to the north at 14 mph and the center of the storm is forecast to exit the state this afternoon and move into Georgia and the Carolinas through Thursday.

Florida Outlook:

- Impacts will continue through this afternoon along the Gulf Coast, but should wane this evening and tonight.
- Hurricane Warnings for the Florida Big Bend coast have been cancelled.
- Tropical Storm Warnings are in effect for Wakulla, Jefferson, Madison, Taylor, Dixie, Lafayette, Madison, Hamilton, Suwannee, Columbia, Gilchrist, Levy, Citrus, coastal Hernando, western Marion, Alachua, Bradford, Union, Baker and inland Nassau Counties.
- The Tropical Storm Watch for Lake County has been cancelled. Wind Advisories remain in place for Flagler, Putnam, St. Johns, Clay, Duval and coastal Nassau Counties.
- Storm Surge Warnings continue for Taylor, Dixie, Levy, Citrus and Hernando Counties as onshore winds combine with the current high tide cycle to produce inundation of 1-4'.
- The Tornado Watch for Hamilton, Suwannee, Columbia, Baker, Union, Bradford, Clay, St. Johns, Duval and Nassau counties will expire at 1pm.
- Flood Watches remain in effect for much of North and Central Florida, but should expire tonight.
- Flood Warnings have been issued for some counties across the western Peninsula and Suwannee Valley. River Flood Warnings are also in
 effect for several West Central and Northeast Florida rivers, which will crest in minor to moderate flood stage between today and early next
 week.
- Dangerous rip currents are expected at all Florida beaches through tomorrow.
