5 PM ET Wednesday: Florida Threats & Changes Since Last Packet



Overview/Recent Changes:

All Storm Surge Warnings have been cancelled. Tropical Storm Warnings continue for just the inland portions of far Northeast Florida. A Tornado Watch remains in effect for Northeast Florida until 8 PM ET. A Flood Watch continue until this evening as well for Northeast Florida. Rivers are rising in Northeast, Southwest, and West Central Florida.

- The center of Elsa is near Valdosta, GA, and moving to the north at 14 mph.
- Elsa remains a tropical storm with maximum sustained winds near 45 mph.
- Elsa will continue moving north or northnortheast tonight and away from the state

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Overall Summary

Tropical Storm Elsa

 The center of Elsa is near Valdosta, GA, and moving to the north at 14 mph. Elsa remains a tropical storm with maximum sustained winds near 45 mph. Elsa will continue moving north or north-northeast tonight and away from the state.

Florida Outlook:

- Trailing strong rain bands are expected to continue to affect portions of Northeast Florida until around midnight.
- Tropical Storm Warnings are in effect for Madison, Hamilton, and inland Nassau Counties. It has been cancelled for all other counties.
- Storm Surge Warnings have been **cancelled**. Tides will run 1-2' above normal in the Big Bend tonight.
- A Tornado Watch for Hamilton, Columbia, Baker, Bradford, Union, Clay, St. Johns, Duval, and Nassau counties will expire at 8pm. An additional tornado watch is not expected.
- Flood Watches remain in effect for Northeast Florida, but should expire tonight.
- Flood Warnings have been issued for many counties across Northeast and Southwest Florida due to standing water from heavy rainfall today. They will continue through this evening.
- **River Flood Warnings** are also in effect for several West Central and Northeast Florida rivers, which will crest in minor to moderate flood stage between today and early next week. Horse Creek, the Manatee River, Myakka River, and Santa Fe River will have crests at Moderate Stage.
- Dangerous rip currents are expected at all Florida beaches through tomorrow.

No additional tropical development is expected within the next 5 days.
