The Weather Prediction Center (WPC) is outlooking a Marginal Risk (level 1 of 4) for Flash Flooding from the I-75 corridor and throughout Northeast Florida and into northern Central Florida where tropical moisture surrounding Debby will allow for showers and thunderstorms to develop, bringing additional rainfall to areas that have already seen several inches over the last 2-4 days. Any additional rainfall may exacerbate the potential for additional flooding.

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Riverine Flooding Chance of River Flooding Based on Range of Forecast Rainfall



Rainfall continues to deposit into the rivers, creeks and waterways across the Florida Big Bend, Northeast Florida and West-Central Florida following Debby. Numerous **River Flood Warnings** remain in effect due expected riverine flooding. **Moderate to major flooding** is ongoing for portions of the Myakka, Manatee, Alafia, Hillsborough, Santa Fe and upper Suwannee River Basins. **Minor to moderate flooding** is expected along the lower Suwannee, Cypress Creek, Anclote, Aucilla and Withlacoochee Rivers. **Additional River Flood Warnings** may be issued in the coming days depending on any additional rainfall and rises in water levels. Water will continue to flow downstream through the basins.

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Hot & Humid Conditions From the National Weather Service (NWS)



Heat index values, or feels-like temperatures, will climb into triple digits nearly statewide this afternoon courtesy of dangerously hot and humid conditions. Heat Advisories remain in effect through late today across portions of the Florida Panhandle, Big Bend and South Florida as hot and humid conditions will create heat index values of 105-110-degrees throughout the afternoon.

It should be noted that several of these counties within the Heat Advisories are ones that were impacted by Debby, which could make cleanup/response activities more difficult for those without power or AC.

Please remember to practice heat safety when outdoors including, taking breaks from direct sunlight when you can, wear loose fitting clothing and drink plenty of water.



Tropical Storm Debby:

- As of 2:00 PM EDT, Debby was located about 55 miles east-southeast of Charleston, South Carolina and moving northeastward at 60 mph.
- · A generally northward motion is expected later today, bringing the center to the South Carolina coast on Thursday morning.
- After crossing the coast, a faster motion toward the north and north-northeast across the Carolina's and U.S. Mid-Atlantic states is expected on Thursday and Friday.
- Maximum sustained winds are near 60 mph with higher gusts and some strengthening is possible today or tonight before the center of Debby reaches the coast of South Carolina.
- · Weakening is forecast to begin on Thursday after the center moves inland.

Florida Outlook:

- Over the past 72 hours, Debby has produced a widespread swath of 5-8" of rainfall along the Florida Gulf Coast and into the Suwannee River Valley, with locally higher amounts of 8-10" measured over the inland Florida Big Bend and south of Tampa Bay. The highest rainfall totals of 10-14" occurred over portions of Charlotte and Sarasota Counties and over the inland Florida Big Bend (mainly west of the I-75 corridor). With now localized rainfall totals in excess of 14-16" observed over the interior Suwannee River Valley (Suwannee, Columbia, Hamilton).
- River Flood Warnings have been issued across numerous North and West Florida Rivers they have reached or are forecast to reach moderate to major flood stage with several others
 forecast to reach minor flood stage.
 - Additional River Flood Warnings will be possible over the next several days as water filters through the basins into the rivers and waterways and further downstream; and updates
 to existing riverine flooding forecasts can be expected.
- Heat index values in the triple digits can be expected nearly statewide this afternoon.
 - Heat Advisories are in effect through this evening across the Florida Panhandle, Big Bend and South Florida where heat index values of up to 110-degrees are expected.
 - When outdoors and helping with response efforts, please make sure to practice heat safety. Be sure to take breaks from direct sunlight, wear loose fitting clothing and drink plenty of water.
- The Weather Prediction Center (WPC) is outlooking a Marginal Risk (level 1 of 4) for Flash Flooding across Northeast Florida and southward into northern Central Florida where scattered showers and thunderstorms developing throughout the afternoon and evening could bring additional rainfall over recently saturated grounds and soils post-Debby could bring additional flooding.
 - Grounds and soils are very saturated following heavy rainfall before and after landfall, and any additional rainfall may exacerbate the potential for additional flooding.
 - · Any heavy downpours over urban and low-lying/poor drainage areas could bring instances of flash flooding.
- Locally strong to severe thunderstorms producing frequent lightning, gusty winds (40-50 mph) and heavy downpours cannot be ruled out during peak heating hours of the day.
